ANU Public Lecture and Launch of Architectures for Peace Lab

The devastation in Gaza and Ukraine is a stark reminder of the extensive reconstruction efforts needed after armed conflict.

These crises underscore the urgent demand for resources to rebuild infrastructure and restore essential services. But reconstruction goes beyond the physical—it requires a nuanced, inclusive approach that addresses the needs of all affected populations, especially marginalised and vulnerable groups.

This lecture will explore one of the most complex aspects of reconstruction: land rights. It will show how conflict disrupts land tenure systems, often worsening inequalities and creating new barriers to lasting peace.

Land is more than territory—it carries political, economic, and cultural weight, often fuelling conflict. With competing land claims risking renewed tensions, understanding and securing equitable land rights is vital to social recovery and long-term resilience.
