



World Order After Iran

The war in Iran, launched by the US and Israel in late February, has had major repercussions on world order. It has killed and displaced tens of thousands, inflicting severe damage on lives and livelihoods, while the weaponisation of key maritime chokepoints has destabilised economies, alliances and infrastructures across Asia. Deep rifts between elites and publics in several countries threaten to intensify regional turbulence. For scholars, students and practitioners of international relations, the war has prompted major debates around law, governance, technology and diplomacy. Together, these developments add to the sense that a world order already precariously stitched together is coming apart at its seams. This one-day conference explores the war's impact on Australian, regional and global politics, with experts drawn from ANU, universities across Australia, and practice.
